LICENSING INFORMATION

Anglers 16 years of age or older must possess a license to fish in Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania offers a variety of resident and non-resident fishing licenses – from a one-day permit up to a lifetime license. In addition, a Trout Permit is required to fish for trout and a Lake Erie Permit is required to fish on the waters of Lake Erie, Presque Isle Bay and Erie tributaries; a combination Trout/ Lake Erie Permit is also an option. Licenses are also available in person from issuing agents in over 700 tackle shops and outdoor stores around the state.





GUIDE TO FISHING Pennsylvania's Great Lakes Region

One of the country's greatest angling destinations!

The wide variety of waterways in Crawford, Erie, Mercer and Venango Counties are home to diverse gamefish species. Whether you prefer dabbling a #14 Elk Hair Caddis for native brookies, floating an olive Wooly Bugger for steelies, pitching a jig-n-pig to cover for largemouth, trolling a crankbait for walleye or simply watching a bobber for a bluegill nibble, this corner of Pennsylvania has it all.

Pennsylvania's Great Lakes Region has over 40 trout streams, 300 miles of warmwater creeks and rivers, 100,000 acres of inland lakes & reservoirs, plus the vast frontier of Lake Erie. Of course, each waterway does not hit a home run for every species. This guide will help you plan where to spend time angling for your favorite species.

SMALLMOUTH BASS:

Northwest Pennsylvania offers world class smallmouth fishing, with Lake Erie leading the way. Lake Erie is the place for quality smallies in the 4 to 7 lb. range during May/June and October/November (8-pounder bass documented), plus unbelievable numbers of 2 to 3-pound bass in the summer. An incredible flowing-water smallmouth fishery exists on both the Allegheny River and French Creek. Conneaut Lake is a bronzeback trophy lake with the potential of 6 lb. bass - particularly after Labor Day. Woodcock Lake and Justus Lake are sleeper smallmouth lakes. Don't overlook Mercer County's Shenango Lake which has developed an outstanding smallmouth bass fishery in recent years. Check out small streams like Oil Creek, Sugar Creek, Sandy Creek, Elk Creek and Conneaut Creek for a unique fly-fishing experience.

LARGEMOUTH BASS:

While largemouth bass are found in just about every pond, lake and reservoir in NWPA, the following waters stand out. Presque Isle Bay is arguably one of the best largemouth fisheries in the state with strong numbers of 2 to 4 lb. bass. For that exceptional big largemouth, check out the smaller natural lakes in the region, including Sugar Lake, Conneaut Lake, Edinboro Lake and Lake LeBoeuf. Don't overlook Lake Wilhelm and Shenango Lake in Mercer County; both offer good-size largemouth as well. However, if you desire to catch numbers of average-size largemouth, visit Pymatuning Lake. Have no worries about when to fish largemouth because the bite is on from April through November.

MUSKY:

Without a doubt, Pymatuning Lake is one of the top lakes in the state for producing exceptional-size muskellunge; anglers troll for them on this lake from early April through December. During the late fall and winter, the hunt for a trophy musky turns to the Allegheny River and French Creek. However, if you have your sight set on casting for a big musky on a small lake, focus your efforts on Justus Lake, Woodcock Lake, Conneaut Lake, Edinboro Lake and Lake LeBoeuf. The PA state record musky of 54 lb. 3 oz. came from Conneaut Lake.



NORTHERN PIKE:

Presque Isle Bay is the early spring and fall hotspot for pike, with ample numbers of 2-footers plus an opportunity for one growing to 3 feet. Other waters where respectable northern pike are encountered include the Allegheny River, Shenango Lake and Conneaut Lake.

WALLEYE:

Perhaps the most desired fish for the table, walleye are pursued by legions of anglers all season long in NW PA. Action starts in early April and continues until early July at Pymatuning Lake where 15 to 18-inch fish are routinely taken. By mid-summer, the focus shifts to trolling the open waters of Lake Erie. (The waters of Erie can quickly turn treacherous due to sudden weather changes. If your boat is not big-water capable or you do not have Great Lakes experience, check into an Erie charter fishing trip.) In the fall, the Allegheny River and French Creek are in the forefront for walleye. Woodcock Lake, Lake Wilhelm and Shenango Lake are also popular with walleye anglers.

CRAPPIE:

Some anglers spend the entire fishing season chasing crappies. While these popular panfish are found in most water, here's the inside scoop on the best waters by season: Shortly after iceout, fish select areas of Presque Isle Bay (Misery Bay, Marina Lake, the Lagoons or Head-of-the-Bay) as well as the shallow mud-bottom bays of



Pymatuning Lake. In late spring, the hottest bites are Pymatuning Lake and Shenango Lake. With the arrival of summer, check out Conneaut Lake and Shenango Lake. In the fall, some of the more popular lakes are: Lake LeBoeuf, Lake Wilhelm, Shenango Lake and Pymatuning Lake. Ice fishing hotspots include Edinboro Lake, Lake Wilhelm, Woodcock Lake, Pymatuning Lake, Conneaut Lake, and Presque Isle Bay.

BLUEGILLS:

Looking for the biggest bluegills in May and June? Presque Isle Bay, Pymatuning Lake, and Conneaut lead the way. Close behind are Shenango Lake, Lake Wilhelm, Justus Lake and Lake Pleasant. These same lakes are excellent waters for bluegills during ice fishing season as well.



PERCH:

Many anglers consider Lake Erie/Presque Isle Bay to be the #1 yellow perch fishery in the world. In late summer and early autumn anglers search for large



schools of perch in the main lake not far off shore – typically 30 to 50 feet of water. By late fall, some perch schools move into Presque Isle to winter over before spawning in the bay with the arrival of spring. Anglers travel distances to ice fish for perch on Presque Isle Bay during the winter. At ice-out, the openwater perch bite kicks off in the Bay and

lasts until almost May. In recent years there has been an explosion of yellow perch in Pymatuning Lake, making it the second-best perch spot in NW PA without question. At an even 3 lbs., the PA state record yellow perch was taken from Lake Frie.



WHITE BASS:

Several lakes in NW PA feature a white bass fishery. The last four state record white bass have come from Conneaut Lake, with the current record standing at 3.9 lbs. Pymatuning Lake and Shenango Lake are also top tier white bass waters. During the summer, white bass often force baitfish upwards in the water column where a wild melee of predator and prey erupt on the surface, offering incredible topwater action. In the late fall with water temps in the 50s, anglers must go deep with jigging spoons to catch trophy white bass.



HYBRID STRIPERS:

The only water in the Pennsylvania's Great Lakes Region to provide an opportunity for hybrid striped bass is Shenango Lake. A hatchery cross between a white bass and striped bass, hybrids can grow to a little over 20 pounds in our region. These exceptionally hard-hitting fish are known for smashing baits, tearing up tackle and making line-stripping runs. Best time to catch stripers in relatively shallow water is from late April to late June. In the summer, stripers follow suspended shad around the lake requiring special presentations.

CATFISH:

If you are looking for a tug of war with a BIG flathead cat, the Allegheny River, Shenango Lake and Shenango River are the places for you to cast a line. Flathead catfish exceeding 30 pounds have been recorded from NW Pennsylvania. Try fishing at night with large live bait from July through September. Quality channel catfish are caught from Pymatuning Lake, Shenango Lake, Lake Wilhelm, and Lake Erie.

LAKE ERIE TROUT:

Some anglers troll for lake trout in the deep water of Erie's Eastern Basin during the summer. But the real fun is casting for lake trout on nearshore shoals during the late fall. And don't be surprised if you hook a big lake-run brown trout or an acrobatic steelhead when trolling deep for walleyes. (However, the primary focus on steelhead occurs during the spawning run up tributary streams). The state record brown trout of 20 lb. 9 oz. and state record lake trout of 31 lb. 13 oz. both came from Lake Erie.



STEELHEAD:

The tributaries of Lake Erie are the only place in the entire state an angler can battle a steelhead one-on-one with a fly rod or spinning gear. Starting in October and continuing through mid-April, anglers will drive for hours to reach the tributaries of Lake Erie for the annual steelhead run. There are numerous tributaries used by the spawning fish. The state record steelhead came from Walnut Creek; it stands at 20 lb. 3 oz. During peak stream migration runs, the tributaries can be crowded with anglers, especially at the more popular sites. Some tributaries are closed entirely to fishing, while others have restricted access. 
INLAND TROUT WATERS:

For anglers who relish the opening day of trout season each year, there are over 80 stocked streams and lakes in NW PA. To verify dates of trout season as well as a complete list of waters, check the PFBC Regulation Summary which comes with each license purchase. Below are special regulation waterways which are open to trout fishing year around; be sure to check PFBC Regulation Summary for limitations and exact boundaries.

- CATCH AND RELEASE FLY-FISHING ONLY 1.3 miles of Little Sandy Creek (Venango County).
- DELAYED HARVEST ARTIFICIAL LURES ONLY 1.18 miles of Cool Spring Creek (Mercer County); two sections totaling 2.55 miles of Oil Creek (Venango County).
- STOCKED TROUT WATERS OPEN TO YEAR-ROUND FISHING: Shenango River at New Hamburg (Mercer County) and Justus Lake (Venango County).

Almost everything about Pymatuning State Park is huge. At 21,122 acres, it is one of the largest state parks in the



Commonwealth. The 17,088-acre Pymatuning Reservoir is the largest lake in the Commonwealth. In its three campgrounds, Pymatuning has the most campsites in the Pennsylvania state park system. More people visit Pymatuning than almost any other state park in Pennsylvania. But the biggest thing about Pymatuning is the fun you can have boating, fishing, swimming, camping and enjoying other recreational opportunities. In addition to the state park facilities, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission operate a fish hatchery and visitor center, and the Pennsylvania Game Commission has wildlife viewing areas.

Fish from shore or stream, bring your boat or hire a charter. Lake Erie was recently ranked #3 out of the top 100 Best Bass Lakes of the Decade by Bassmaster magazine. The wide variety of waterways offer diverse game fish species including steelhead, trout, walleye, pike, bluegill, perch and small & largemouth bass. Averages of 1.5 million fish are caught each year in Lake Erie, Presque Isle Bay and its surrounding waterways, such as Elk Creek and Walnut Creek. Updated stream enhancements and controlled spawning grounds guarantee productive fishing holes for a variety of species. Several fishing charters, boat liveries, canoe and kayak rentals, lifts and marinas are located throughout the county and on Presque Isle State Park.

Located near Sandy Lake, Pa., the 2,856-acre state park features 1,860-acre Lake Wilhelm, which is popular with anglers. 20-hp motors can be used on the lake and there is also a 241-slip marina. Many recreational activities attract visitors in every season. During the summer months, the popular activities are boating, fishing, hiking, and biking. A twelve-mile scenic biking trail follows the shoreline of Lake Wilhelm. In the winter months, the state park is a great place for cross-country skiing, ice skating, snowmobiling, and ice fishing. Also located at Maurice K. Goddard State Park is one of the state's designated scenic byways. Lake Wilhelm Scenic Byway is 6.4 miles long and runs the western side of Lake Wilhelm and Sandy Lake.

A 3,560-acre river lake. Visitors may spend their day picnicking, camping, boating, jet skiing, water skiing, or enjoying nature's beauty at one of the many recreation or access areas located on the lake. Fishing enthusiasts



are attracted to the waters for bass, walleye, muskellunge, and a variety of panfish that inhabit the lake. Located at the lake is a trail for off-road vehicles. Around the shorelines are lovely picnic sites and pavilions to rent for a day of fun. Another popular activity is bird watching, with a large variety of migratory birds stopping over at the lake. Birds that have their home here include bald eagles, osprey, and trumpeter swans. Other animals that inhabit the lake are beavers and river otters.

The Oil Creek Valley is the site of the world's first commercially successful oil well. Oil Creek State Park



tells the story of the early petroleum industry by interpreting oil boomtowns, wells, extraction, and transportation. Oil Creek carves a scenic valley of deep hollows, steep hillsides, and wetlands. Oil Creek is known for its bass and trout. Boughton Run, Troy Run, and Jones Run provide brook trout fishing. There are two delayed-harvest artificial lure-only areas that cover 2.5 miles of Oil Creek.
